





MESSAGE FROM THE LEADERSHIP: IN OUR LIFETIME

Dear Supporters and Friends,

It was a monumental year for MiracleFeet. With over 25,000 children enrolled in treatment in 178 clinics in 20 countries, we feel more confident than ever that our bold vision is truly possible: The disability caused by neglected clubfoot is a major problem that can be solved in our lifetime.

Our fiscal year ended with a visit to Grand Bassa County, Liberia, with Pulitzer Prize-winning *New York Times* columnist Nicholas Kristof. There we met a family with three generations of women born with clubfoot surviving in a hut, dependent on the generosity of their neighbors. The newest member of their family, a little girl named Miracle, was born with the same birth defect as her mother and grandmother. She will, however, have a very different life. Seeing her with straight feet and a MiracleFeet brace at the end of her little legs was a powerful validation of our vision, approach, and philosophy.

In our sixth year, we have proved that our capacity-building model, public-private partnerships, extensive data analysis, and use of technology can change the face of clubfoot. We are proud to highlight the benefits of each of these areas throughout this report. From piloting a new data collection app in India and Madagascar to distributing the award-winning MiracleFeet Brace to 14 countries, we have established ourselves as an innovative and high-impact leader in clubfoot global health. This was illustrated by our role in launching the major public health campaign, *Ending Clubfoot Disability: A Global Strategy.* This collaboration with members of Global Clubfoot Initiative helped us secure a wonderfully generous \$5M grant from Oak Foundation.

Every birth. Every little foot. Every worried family. We will not stop until every baby born with clubfoot is living with confidence, not stigma. We will keep supporting clinics until every family knows there is hope for their child. Our resolve has never been stronger, and we gather that strength from MiracleFeet's many partners, donors, supporters, and friends. We are incredibly grateful for your support and hope you will continue to step up with us in solving this problem—in our lifetime.

Untreated clubfoot is one of the leading causes of disability in much of the world.




A COMMON PROBLEM

Clubfoot is a congenital birth defect that causes one or both feet to turn inward and upward.

In developed countries, clubfoot is often diagnosed via ultrasound and is routinely treated shortly after birth.


90% of children born with clubfoot are born in low- and middle-income countries where access to proper treatment is limited.



THE PONSETI METHOD

- Gentle manipulation and weekly casts for 3-8 weeks when treated at hirth.
- An outpatient procedure (tenotomy) is performed to release the Achilles tendon.
- Use of a foot abduction brace at night for 4-5 years to maintain correction.

PROVEN TREATMENT

- When done properly, treatment is effective in 95% of cases.
- The Ponseti Method is non-surgical, safe, and well-suited to low-resource settings.
- This approach is increasingly found to be effective in older children and even adults.
- This treatment is affordable: just \$250 provides full treatment for one child.







A Bold Goal

We believe that all children born with clubfoot, no matter where they live, should have access to proper treatment. MiracleFeet is playing a leading role in the development and launch of a global plan that lays out a roadmap to achieve this exciting goal by 2030.

We worked with other members of Global Clubfoot Initiative (GCI) to launch Ending Clubfoot Disability: A Global Strategy on June 3rd, 2017, World Clubfoot Day. GCI is a consortium of organizations with proven expertise and experience in establishing national clubfoot programs in low- and middle-income countries.

By working together to raise a combined \$160M, we believe we can essentially end one of the major causes of physical disability forever. With \$11M invested every year for 14 years, we can create sustainable national clubfoot programs in 107 target low- and middle-income countries.


RUNFREE

The strategy builds on the well-tested model of working with local partners and governments to build capacity, leverage technology to increase efficiency, and collect and analyze data to improve outcomes and measure impact. Ending Clubfoot Disability: A Global Strategy ensures that by 2030, all low- and middle- income countries (excluding those with fewer than 50 clubfoot births per year) will have a sustainable national program in place to deliver quality care. Every program will include:

- training providers
- building awareness that clubfoot is treatable
- improving clubfoot identification and referral processes
- providing supplies for bracing, casting, and tenotomies
- implementing strategies to improve adherence to treatment

With these national programs in place, 1.2 million children will receive treatment. Public health problems are rarely solved with such small amounts of funding, and MiracleFeet is excited to work with our partners to make this dream a reality.

<u>INNOVATION</u>



BRACE TECHNOLOGY

As part of our global rollout, the award-winning MiracleFeet brace is undergoing a 90-person study at Wadia Children's Hospital in Mumbai using sensor technology developed by the Indian Institute of Technology Bombay. The study will show whether the ease-of-use features of the MiracleFeet brace and sensors impact brace compliance.

MOBILE DATA COLLECTION

mHealth is a hot topic in global health, and MiracleFeet shares in the optimism that mobile-based apps can make data collection more efficient and allow data-based decision-making to take place at the clinic level. CaST, a data collection app, was developed by MiracleFeet in collaboration with Global Clubfoot Initiative (GCI) and Dimagi, a leading mHealth company. The app is currently being piloted in clinics in India and Madagascar. The final version will be introduced to all MiracleFeet-supported clinics in FY 2018, replacing the current PC-based system.

eLEARNING

MiracleFeet is excited about the new Africa Clubfoot Training (ACT) project, a more interactive and hands-on training curriculum well-suited to physical therapists and physician assistants, as well as orthopedic surgeons. Oxford University, GCI, and CURE-Ethiopia developed and tested the curriculum. We are working with GCI and Open Pediatrics at Boston Children's Hospital to develop an eLearning version of the curriculum that includes a 3D simulation of the foot. Our goal is to further improve training outcomes and provide muchneeded reference materials for trainees once they return to their clinics.

PROGRAM UPDATES 2017

ASIA

INDIA MiracleFeet funds programs in 14 states, home to half of India's 1.2 billion people. We are the largest donor to the India Clubfoot Program (a partnership between CURE India and the State Ministries of Health), which has a presence in every state. The programs we support grew an average of 30%, with over 1,000 more new children being enrolled than in the previous year. We work closely with CURE India's clinic teams to ensure treatment quality is maintained as the program scales. Our growth in India is enabled by MiracleFeet India, which raises funds from Indian corporate and foundation donors.

NEPAL We increased support of the Hospital & Rehabilitation Centre for Disabled Children's (HRDC) clubfoot program, expanding from one to four clinics. As well as providing high-quality treatment, clinic staff use motorcycles to follow up with families in remote areas, resulting in impressive patient retention rates.

PHILIPPINES In collaboration with Philippine Band of Mercy (PBM), we continue to expand with emphasis on training new providers, especially in Manila. The Philippines program was one of the first to fully adopt the MiracleFeet brace. Feedback from parents and providers has been extremely positive.

VIETNAM (New in FY2017) We initiated support of Mobility Outreach International's (MOI) program to enable growth and expand parent education and awareness efforts, with a focus on two of the larger clinics in Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh.

MYANMAR (New in FY2017) We started supporting clinics in Yangon Children's Hospital and Mandalay Orthopedic Hospital in April 2017 with Walk for Life (WFL). Over 220 children have been enrolled in treatment, making Myanmar one of our fastest growing new programs.

SRI LANKA (New in FY2017) Many of the 380+ families with children born with clubfoot each year in Sri Lanka are not aware of treatment options or lack access to providers trained in the Ponseti method. We began supporting one hospital in Colombo, the capital, in April in partnership with Handicap International. Our focus going forward will be training orthopedic doctors, adding clinics in other areas, and increasing clubfoot awareness across the country.

INCREASING ACCESS TO TREATMENT WORLDWIDE

AFRICA

LIBERIA Liberia is rebounding after the Ebola crisis and recently celebrated treating over 1,500 children. Our partner, Faith Orthopedic Rehabilitation Center (FACORC), expanded their impressive outreach and identification programs, training 90 midwives who have become a major source of referrals. New York Times reporter Nicholas Kristof



published an article following his visit to Liberia—bringing to light the relatively simple and inexpensive solution provided by the Ponseti method.

TANZANIA A newly-formed and well-functioning network of doctors and healthcare providers has resulted in enormous recent progress. In FY2017, eight trainings by local providers helped spread information about the Ponseti method. One of our key providers, Dr. Rachel Nungu, was selected to participate in the Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young African Leaders and will spend three months in the US for professional development.

MADAGASCAR MiracleFeet, in partnership with Fondation Telma and the Ministry of Health, supported two clinics in our first year, with plans to expand to six over the next two to three years to provide national coverage. Thanks to strong outreach programs and local marketing campaigns, awareness of clubfoot and the efficacy of available treatment is growing. The Ministry of Health fully supports treatment with the Ponseti method, and their advocacy helped enable us to exceed our FY2017 target for patients treated.

ZIMBABWE In partnership with Zimbabwe Sustainable Clubfoot Programme, we focused efforts in FY2017 on building awareness and support for clubfoot treatment with the Ministry of Health. A very difficult political and economic environment affected the ability of families to reach the clinics. Despite the challenges, 368 new children were enrolled in the 13 clinics, and 130 medical practitioners were trained in the Ponseti method.

SOUTH AFRICA & BOTSWANA MiracleFeet partnered with STEPS-SA to support the treatment of children in several clinics in South Africa and in Botswana. We previously supported clinics in Namibia, but the partnership was dissolved due to changes in Namibian laws. MiracleFeet will no longer be funding STEPS-SA, because the organization has secured adequate local funding.

LATIN AMERICA

NICARAGUA The program supports two clinics in the populous areas of Leon and Managua. The third clinic, located in the South Caribbean Region, provides access for rural families, where typically half of children start treatment when they are older than 12 months, reflecting the need to continue raising awareness that clubfoot is treatable. Dr. Mario Sequeira,



one of our first partners, remains a passionate advocate for the Ponseti method and has treated more than 3,000 patients over his career. Nicaragua is another country that has fully adopted the MiracleFeet brace with enthusiastic reviews from parents.

BRAZIL We continue to support two clinics in São Paulo at the request of Brazil's leading Ponseti practitioners. This small but important program has influenced uptake of the Ponseti Method in two leading medical centers, which we hope will ultimately result in systemic change at the national level.

PARAGUAY This program grew significantly in its second year of operation. In partnership with Fundación Solidaridad, we now have four clinics primarily located in the most populated regions. The clinic in the Central Department had a high volume of patients from all parts of the country. Paraguay is a powerful example of what can be accomplished with strong family and community involvement (including several professional soccer players) in the cause of untreated clubfoot, and the country greatly exceeded their projected new patient goals.

ECUADOR The program with Fundación Hermano Miguel is active in three of the most populous cities: Quito, Cuenca, and Guayaquil. In addition to treatment, this program provides family education sessions throughout the year. We are optimistic that changes in government will enable us to reach more children.

BOLIVIA (New in FY2017) We formed a new partnership with Handicap International, and we are now supporting clinics in Chuquisaca, Oruro, and Potosi. Our programs greatly benefit from the strong support of the Ministry of Health. Some parents travel great distances for appointments, with one mother and child traveling five hours by bus and two hours on foot, indicating the great need for MiracleFeet support to build a comprehensive national program.

GUATEMALA (New in FY2017) We are already supporting six clinics, and our partner organization, Asociación de Padres y Amigos de Personas con Discapacidad de Santiago Atitlán (ADISA), is helping us build connections with the Ministry of Health. With each clinic in a strategic location, we hope to maximize reach.





It was another terrific year with over \$3.7M raised from individuals, foundations, and corporate partners to support our programs.


Highlights include:

- Over 50% of donors in 2017 were first-time donors, many of which were secured from our digital marketing and PR successes.
- Creation of a high-profile Board of Directors in India to support our goal of raising all the funds for India in India by 2022.
- MiracleFeet was proud to be named a Top 200 Finalist for the MacArthur 100 & Change \$100M grant—an impressive feat for a small organization in the company of much larger NGOs.

Building on our success in 2017, we continue to focus on growing our fundraising base to meet the needs outlined in *Ending Clubfoot Disability: A Global Strategy.* Our goal is to increase annual funds raised from \$3.8M to \$8M per year by 2022, which is ambitious but in line with our consistent 20%+ growth over the last 5 years. This will be greatly supported by our international MiracleFeet affiliates registered in India, Germany, and the UK.






